Eamon Ryan TD

Minister for Environment, Climate, Communications and Transport

Eamon Ryan is the Minister for Environment, Climate, Communications and Transport. He represents Dublin Bay South constituency.

He was born in Dublin and studied commerce in UCD. He went on to found a cycling tourism

company, Irish Cycling Safaris, in the late 1980s and in 1996 won the Ernst & Young Tourism Enterprise Award.

He began his political career as a Dublin City Councillor. He was first elected to the Dáil in 2002 and served as a Government Minister for Communications, Energy and Natural Resources from 2007 - 2011. He became the leader of the Green Party in 2011 and led his party into coalition with Fianna Fail and Fine Gael after the 2020 election. He was then appointed to his current ministry.



Sinéad Hickey Head of Sustainability, SISK

Sinéad is the Head of Sustainability for Ireland and Europe at John Sisk & Son.

For over 14 years, Sinéad has worked in a range of areas including sustainability strategy development and operationalisation, ESG assessments, sustainability reporting and

social impact programme development. She previously held a global sustainability position at US multinational Abbott.

A graduate of the University of Limerick (BA) and University College Cork (MBS) and a Fellow of the Institute of Corporate Responsibility and Sustainability (ICRS), Sinéad is currently the Chairperson of Chambers Ireland Sustainable Business Council and an ICRS Ireland Hub Steering Board Member.

Rodolfo Lacy Director, Environment Directorate,

Rodolfo Lacy is Director of the Environment Directorate of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD).

Dr. Lacy has extensive as an environmental policy maker and before taking up his current

role, he served for 6 years as Deputy Minister of Environmental Policy and Planning at the Ministry of Environment and Natural Resources of Mexico. He has also been a chief negotiator at the United Nations Climate Change Conferences and Co-chair of the Global Methane Initiative.

As Director of the renowned Mario Molina Centre in his native Mexico, he has led policy research on renewable energy, emission inventory, climate change, and the sustainable use of natural resources.

Dr Lacy holds a PhD in Science and Environmental Engineering from the Metropolitan Autonomous University in Mexico and a Master's in Environmental Planning from MIT.



Quentin Dupriez

Policy Analyst, Climate Action, European Commission

Quentin Dupriez is a policy analyst in the Strategy and Economic Assessment unit of the Directorate-General for Climate Action at the European Commission. His work focuses on the macro-economic aspects of climate policy, investment and State aid.

Prior to joining DG CLIMA, he worked at the Irish desk in the Directorate-General Economic and Financial Affairs for four years and for the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development for eight years. He holds a PhD in economics from the London School of Economics and a M.A. in international relations from the Johns Hopkins University.
